The word "economic" means "related to money or the economy". For example, we can say "That country has severe economic problems". The word "economical", on the other hand, means "providing good value" or "requiring less money than usual". For example, we can say "The car cost quite a lot to buy, but it's very economical to run".

When talking about jobs, people sometimes confuse the adjectives "full-time" and "permanent", and the adjectives "part-time" and "temporary".

The difference is that "full-time" and "part-time" indicate the number of hours a person works each week, whereas "permanent" and "temporary" tell us whether an employee's contract terminates after a certain period or not. If you work 16 hours a week, you have a part-time job; if your contract only lasts for two months, you have a temporary job.
